Flying with honor

Jackson Energy grateful for our local heroes

ocal veterans who served during the Vietnam War were scheduled to represent Jackson Energy as participants on an Honor Flight to Washington, D.C., on Aug. 23.

Garnett Gibson of Keavy and Marvin Williams of London traveled to the nation's capital with other Kentucky war veterans to experience a full day of sightseeing and see memorials built in their honor.

"Making it possible for both Garnett and Marvin and the other heroes from Kentucky to make this trip is our sincere pleasure," says Carol Wright, president and CEO of Jackson Energy. "We owe them so much for the freedoms we enjoy, and we hope all the veterans return saying it was one of the greatest days of their lives."

Gibson, 83, served in the U.S. Army and Army Reserve during the Vietnam War. Gibson spent the majority of his years of service stationed in Germany where his duties included patrolling the Berlin Wall. Once back in the states, he was assigned to the Delta Company as a mechanical instructor, providing technical training in vehicle and equipment maintenance. Gibson earned the National Defense Service Medal, in addition to the Expert Rifle badge.



Williams, 77, served in the U.S. Army with the 1st Calvary Division. His duties included serving in the weapons infantry unit, squad leader and assisting as a machine gunner. He witnessed first-hand the Battle of Angel's Wing in 1969 near the Cambodian border in Vietnam. In less than two years of service, he received the Bronze Star Medal with Valor, two Air Medals, and the Purple Heart for wounds sustained in combat.

The trip took Gibson and Williams to view memorials dedicated to those who served in

World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War. The group also toured memorials dedicated to those who served in the Air Force and Marine Corps. The day culminated with a wreath-laying at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery.

On their return flight, the veterans participated in "mail call." Each received cards and letters thanking them for their service to the nation.

Jackson Energy helped organize a

special homecoming celebration for the Honor Flight participants. Families, friends and supporters lined Blue Grass Airport to cheer on the veterans as they paraded through the airport terminal building.

Power of preparation

ith severe weather events occurring more frequently, now more than ever, it makes sense to be prepared. During a prolonged power outage or other emergency, this means having enough food, water and supplies to last at least a few days.

In honor of National Preparedness Month in September, I want to remind members of our community about the power of preparation. While you don't have to achieve a doomsday prepper level of preparedness, there are several practical steps you can take to keep you and your family safe.

We recommend starting with the basics:

- Assemble a grab-and-go disaster kit. Include items like nonperishable food, water (one gallon per person, per day), diapers, batteries, flashlights, prescription medications, first-aid kit and battery-powered radio.
- Develop a plan for communicating with family and friends (i.e., via text, social media, third party, etc.).
- Have some extra cash available; during a power outage, electronic card readers and cash machines may not work.
- Store important documents (birth certificates, property deed, etc.) in safe place away from home (for example, a bank safe deposit box).

Caring for vulnerable family members

If you have family members who are older or have special needs, make sure they have enough medication and supplies for a few days. If you have an infant or young children, be sure you have ample formula, diapers, medication and other supplies on hand to weather an outage lasting several days.

Keeping four-legged family members safe

For families with pets, having a plan in place will help reduce worry and stress during an emergency.

- Bring pets indoors at the first sign of a storm or other emergency. Pets can become disoriented and frightened during severe weather.
- Microchip your pet and ensure the contact information is up to date.
- Create an emergency kit for pets (with shelf-safe food and bottled water).

Trip highlights included a tour of Thomas Jefferson's Monticello, a visit to Arlington National Cemetery, where students took part in a wreath-laying ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the 9/11 Memorial at the Pentagon, the Marine Corps Sunset Parade and a walking tour of D.C.'s iconic memorials and monuments. Students also spent time exploring the Smithsonian museums and experienced the power of language at the Planet Word Museum.

For the first time, Kentucky's delegation toured the White House, with some students catching a glimpse of President Donald Trump as he oversaw a flagpole installation on the lawn.
