Space heaters can cause electric bills

to spike

If you use a space heater in your home, please be aware that it can cause a significant increase in your monthly bill.

If the cost does not deter you, remember how important it is to use space heaters safely. Make sure your unit is equipped with automatic shut-off features and heating element guards.

Place your space heater out of high-traffic areas and on level, hard, non-flammable floor surfaces—not on carpets, furniture or countertops.

Remember to keep space heaters at least 3 feet from all flammable items such as draperies, blankets and sofas.

Finally, never leave a space heater unattended. Turn it off or unplug the unit before leaving the room or going to bed.



A 1,000-watt space heater operating 12 hours a day will add about \$43 to your monthly bill

Operation RoundUP is a program that gives Jackson Energy members the opportunity to give back to their community a few cents at a time.

It is solely funded by co-op members who voluntarily choose to round their electric bill to the next even dollar amount each month. The extra money, which averages 50 cents a month, is applied to the Operation RoundUP Fund.

Jackson Energy members also serve on the volunteer Operation RoundUP Board of Trustees. The trustees receive and evaluate grant applications on a quarterly basis.
